1. Introduction

The City of Frisco has received Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) since 2005. The period of October 1, 2021, to September 30, 2022, is the second year Action Plan under the five-year PY 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan required by HUD for the use of CDBG funds. This Plan includes a proposed budget and overall programs intended to benefit primarily low- and moderate-income households, individuals, or areas within the city limits.

All federal funds must be used to meet one or more of the following HUD objectives:

- Create suitable living environments,
- Provide decent housings, and
- Expand economic opportunities for citizens of Frisco.

Finally, the programs must align with the overall vision and policies from the City of Frisco's 2015 Comprehensive Plan by implementing and partnering with organizations for programs that improve the City's built and social environments.

In the 2021 program year, Community Development Block Grant funds are allocated to Public Services, Public Improvement and Infrastructure, Single-Family Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation, Fair Housing Education, Homeless Prevention, Homeless Support Services and Grant Administration. (See Projects in Section AP 35–Projects). The City received \$671,872 in PY 2021 CDBG funds. Program income is projected to be approximately \$13,000 for a total of \$684,872 in available program funds.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The City of Frisco is a young, rapidly growing and relatively affluent community which is able to provide its residents with a good quality of life and a range of community services. However, the City does have

a significant low-income population as over 1,500 households have an income of less than \$25,000, and 4.4 percent of the population lives in poverty.

During the Consolidated Planning Process, the City welcomed comments through Public Hearings, surveys, and meetings per federal regulations and the City's current Citizen Participation Plan. Concerns were expressed about the significant number of youth in the City, but at the same time the aging of the City's population, the growth of non-family households, and the increasing number of households facing a housing cost burden.

These concerns translate to a number of needs, both general and specific, as noted in the following assessment. Perhaps the most important issue to emerge is that of cost burden and affordable housing. Indeed, housing affordability, homeless prevention and homelessness are three closely related concerns. The need for supportive services, especially for low-income households, youth, and victims of domestic violence emerged from both an examination of the data and from public input. Though the City's infrastructure and public facilities are generally new and in good condition, some residents did express the need for improved streets, drainage, and lighting in neighborhoods.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

Past performance and activities were considered when formulating the strategies for the PY 2021 Annual Plan. The Self-Evaluation sections of our recent PY 2019 CAPER describes our progress. Most recently, the City was successful in the Housing objective category, Housing Rehabilitation Program, surpassing the goal of three (3) units by one 1 unit for a total of four (4) units.

The Homeless objective categories were also successful in PY 2019 by reaching 100% of the goal to assist 17 individuals through homeless support in overnight shelter at the Samaritan Inn. The Frisco Family Services Center BASIC Homeless Prevention Program exceeded its goal of homeless prevention services for 388 persons by serving 1056 persons.

In PY 2019, Collin County Committee on Aging meal programs served 106 households, exceeding the goal of 35 under the Non-Homeless Special Needs Objectives category, Elderly.

In addition to CDBG-funded programs, the City provided Social Service Grant (SSG) and Transportation Grant funds through the general fund. These funds provided assistance for homeless youth, domestic abuse victims, elderly populations, and other low- and moderate-income persons with transitional housing, food pantry services, youth scholarships, counseling services, clothing, and other needs.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

The City Council of Frisco, Texas appointed the City of Frisco Social Services and Housing Board (SSHB) to serve as the Citizen Advisory Committee for the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG). In addition to making funding recommendations regarding the use of CDBG funding, the Social Services and Housing Board is responsible for holding public hearings and meetings to solicit input on the development of the Annual Action Plan under the adopted Citizen Participation Plan. The SSHB

additionally makes allocation recommendations concerning the City of Frisco General Fund Social Service Grant and Transportation Grant funds.

As part of the Citizen Participation Plan, several activities provided opportunity for citizen input.

- The City posted notices in the local newspaper, on the City of Frisco website, and in the outside display case, on digital display ads at the Frisco Public Library, and at the Frisco Housing Authority.
- The City held a grant application workshop on January 15, 2021.
- The SSHB hosted public meetings on January 13, 2021, February 10, 2021, and March 10, 2021. Each applicant seeking grant funds made an oral presentation regarding their request for funds to the Social Services and Housing Board during one of the public meetings.
- The SSHB proposed awards for the CDBG funds on May 12, 2021.
- On June 13, 2021, the City published the Proposed Allocations of funding for review and a 30 day comment period that began on June 13, 2021 and ran until July 14, 2021. Copies of the plan were made available electronically online and hard copies at City Hall.
- All public meetings were duly published in the paper of general circulation, as required, and an opportunity was provided for citizen input. The City held two (2) public hearings during the development of the FY2021 Action Plan on June 9, 2021, and July 14, 2021.
- The City requested input from social service agencies, including, but not limited to civic groups, the school district, Collin County Homeless Coalition, Denton County Homeless Coalition, and the Metro Dallas Homeless Alliance.

5. Summary of public comments

1. Introduction

The City of Frisco, as the administrator of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, will work closely with nonprofit organizations, the school and college districts, private sector organizations, such as banks, contractors and developers, and other government entities such as the Frisco Housing Authority to address the community objectives outlined in this plan.

The cities of Frisco, Allen, Plano, and McKinney work together to build cohesive regional responses to our low- and moderate-income residents. Each city experiences similar community needs, and our partnership allows us to build better programs. We were all part of the North Texas Regional Affordable Housing coalition to respond to the Regional Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing (RAFFH) Assessment of Fair Housing (AFH) process that was reduced to the Analysis of Impediments during the process. From that point, we have built a network to work together to address the needs of our communities.

The City has seen some growth in the nonprofit section, but we are still highly dependent of social service agencies that are in other neighboring communities. Rapid growth has outpaced the social service providers' capacity to meet the needs of the residents. As a result, many of the service providers who serve Frisco residents are located outside of the City Limits of Frisco. One of the goals of this Plan is to both strengthen the capacity of service providers within the City limits as well as to encourage and support opportunities for service providers in adjoining cities to provide services within the Frisco city limits. The City of Frisco General Fund Social Service Grant also provides general funds to agencies as they build capacity and meet needs in the community.

The City works closely with two large social service organizations providing services to low- and moderate-income households within the City of Frisco:

- The Frisco Housing Authority, the sole provider of low-income housing in the City of Frisco; and
- Frisco Family Services Center, an emergency services provider in the City limits of Frisco.

These organizations have worked closely together to implement the programs proposed for funding. Frisco Family Services Center has a strong partnership with the Frisco Housing Authority. CDBG funds have been used to support Frisco Family Services Center in its ever-expanding work with the Hispanic population by providing a bi-lingual social worker to address the needs of these families.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The City of Frisco works with the Metro Dallas Homeless Alliance (MDHA), the lead agency for the Continuum of Care for Dallas and Collin Counties, Collin County Homeless Coalition, and Denton County Homeless Coalition to address the needs of homeless persons.

The City of Frisco has seen very few incidents of chronic homelessness. However, we have seen increased homelessness over the past three (3) years. In instances where we are advised of a resident experiencing homelessness, we may do one or two of the following:

1. Contact MDHA to have a Coordinated Access intake to get our homeless resident on the CAS list, so that they can be considered for available housing;
2. Contact an outreach team and request that they visit the City of Frisco area to provide assistance to the homeless resident;
3. Contact a service provider that may be able to give assistance to the homeless individual or family.

The City of Frisco provides homeless prevention funds to Frisco Family Services. These funds are used to address situations that our low- and moderate-income residents may encounter and keep them housed. These funds leverage other funding sources received by Frisco Family Services to offer a robust service plan and work with the resident on addressing needs that may recur. The City is also working with the Frisco Public Library (FPL) to build a relationship in order to help facilitate efforts for the homeless who frequently utilize the library's resources and services.

The City is actively involved with Continuum of Care actions and programs, as noted above. This includes frequent consultation with various public/private entities within the City and the Counties that provide assisted housing, health services and social services. This consultation includes needs assessment, program design, the development of performance standards and policies and procedures for the administration of HMIS.

The City Council appoints a seven (7) member advisory board, the Social Service and Housing Board (the “Board”), to assist the City Council and staff in formulating the Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plans. The Board worked with staff to develop recommended projects and allocation amounts for funding with the program’s annual entitlement grant. When identifying and prioritizing projects for program funding, the Board considered public input gathered from public hearings and comments during regular monthly meetings.

1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

The City Council of Frisco, Texas appointed the City of Frisco Social Services and Housing Board to serve as the Citizen Advisory Committee for the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG). In addition to making funding recommendations regarding the use of CDBG funding, the Social Services and Housing Board is responsible for holding public hearings and meetings to solicit input on the development of the Annual Action Plan per the adopted Citizen Participation Plan.

On December 4, 2020, the City of Frisco provided Notice of Availability of Community Development Block Grant funds in a Legal Notice in the newspaper of general circulation. Nonprofit agencies interested in applying for funding were provided the opportunity to apply for the Public Service funds available under that NOFA beginning January 15, 2021 and was available until February 19, 2021. The City hosted a grant workshop on January 15, 2021 to provide information and allow interested organizations to ask questions.

The City of Frisco provided Notice of Public Hearing for the agencies seeking funding to take place during the months of January, February, and March 2021. There were 20 agencies seeking grant funds. In May 2021, the Social Services and Housing Board scored the applications and discussed each use and offered their recommendations for funding at a public meeting.

On June 27, 2021, a Notice of Public Hearing was posted for the Social Services and Housing Board meeting on June 9, 2021, to receive input from the residents of Frisco to determine the community's needs and receive recommendations on how the Community Development Block Grant funding should be disbursed for the PY 2021 Annual Action Plan.

On June 13 and June 27, 2021 the City of Frisco provided Notice of Public Hearing of the July 14, 2021 Social Service and Housing Board meeting and 30 day comment period on the draft PY 2021 Action Plan and CDBG allocations. The comment period began on June 13, 2021 and ended on July 14, 2021.

A second Public Hearing was held at the Social Services and Housing Board meeting on July 14, 2021, to receive citizen input on the Draft PY 2021 Annual Action Plan.

The City continues to cultivate funding partners who can match the City's investment of CDBG funds. The City administration recognizes that the City's annual entitlement and formula allocations are not enough to meet all its needs. Additional funds need to be raised to ensure that more affordable housing is available for those in need.

Matching requirements have been satisfied with other eligible financial resources and/or in-kind services, and the City will continue to seek this type of matching as well as financial matches. Matching resources from non-profit recipients are anticipated to total over \$100,000.

Other matching sources or leveraging opportunities include organizations receiving Continuum of Care funds to provide services to the homeless population of Collin County. Also, the City has worked with Inclusive Communities Project (ICP) to increase the amount of affordable housing in Frisco by forming a partnership to develop multi-family rental dwelling units for low income persons.

In addition, The City of Frisco has allocated \$1 per capita of general funds to fund a Social Service Grant which provides funds to organizations which provide social services to the citizens of Frisco.

If appropriate, describe publically owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

The City of Frisco Senior Adult Activity Center is used by the Collin County Committee on Aging to serve congregate meals to the elderly Monday through Friday at no cost to the organization.

The target areas in the City include the low/mod census tracts which have the highest levels of poverty. Also, a person or household meeting the program eligibility for the CDBG-funded programs may reside anywhere in the city to receive CDBG services.

Generally, areas selected for CDBG funded projects must be at least 51 percent low-and-moderate income in population. Based on the limited number of areas in Frisco that meet this criterion, the City qualifies as an exception grantee during the PY 2021 Action Plan period. Frisco census tract areas comprised of 23.89 percent of low-and-moderate income individuals will qualify as eligible to receive CDBG funding for allowable project activities.

Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

In the identified low-income neighborhoods, the housing stock is typically older and often in need of repair or renovation. In general, there are few businesses or amenities. These areas have been areas of concern in the past and emerged while examining the data. They were mentioned during the focus group and Public Hearing discussions throughout the Consolidated Plan process. These discussions confirmed the already known needs of these areas, complementing or corroborating the data. The requirements in these target areas are numerous and varied. The principal needs are: 1) housing rehabilitation, 2) public improvements to improve/revitalize neighborhoods, 3) public service programs for the elderly, the disabled, and youth, and 4) assistance to the homeless and those at-risk of homelessness.

The opportunities for improvement in these areas are significant. First, the City can keep residents in safe, affordable housing and prevent additional persons and families from becoming homeless. Second, the City can improve the quality of life by revitalizing these neighborhoods economically and in their appearance. The barriers to improvement are significant. The amount of effort and resources needed to provide the necessary assistance to these areas is significant. The City has encountered homes in such disrepair that the cost to repair them would be more than the current structure is worth. Currently, the

City does not have a reconstruction program.

Discussion

There are two target neighborhoods in our low- and moderate-income target areas:

Neighborhood 1) Bounded on the West by First Street, on the South by Ash Street, on the East by South County Road, and on the North by Main Street.

This neighborhood contains some of the oldest housing stock in the City of Frisco. These homes are located on narrow streets with leaner setbacks, no sidewalks, and are more likely to have lead-based paint. Neighborhood 2 contains is the city's mobile home park that is an enclosed high-density area.

Neighborhood 2) Bounded on the East by Parkwood Blvd, on the South by Lebanon Road, on the East by Preston Road, and on the North by Wade Blvd - specifically Preston North Park.

This neighborhood is primarily a mobile home residential area. Some owners have been bricking in their mobile homes over recent years to make their residence a more permanent structure. City staff has been in conversation with Habitat for Humanity of Collin County regarding a partnership to build homes for low-income residents within the City of Frisco. This area holds the most potential for that partnership to create homes.

These homes and neighborhoods are our highest concentrations of poverty in the city. However, they are typically our lowest utilizers of programs in terms of our Housing Rehabilitation services. We are unaware of the reason, but feel that it may be they are primarily renters. We are going to work on a targeted effort to engage these communities and have included a beautification plan in our Consolidated Plan to see if this is something we can do in these neighborhoods. These neighborhoods were not brought up by any individual or group in our citizen participation process.

Neighborhood beautification is a potentially good project for these areas. If the issue is renter status, this type of project will provide an amenity to the resident without enriching the landlord who may be failing to provide beautification as an amenity to the renter, and will add value to the area that is seeing growth without causing a financial burden to the resident. We will assess this to address the situation as we build out our new program.

Affordable Housing

AP-55 Affordable Housing – 91.220(g)

Introduction

The City's housing priorities include improving existing affordable housing stock. During the past program year, the City has ramped up efforts to market the Housing Rehabilitation Program, including mailouts to target neighborhoods with high incidences of poverty or low-income residents. These mailouts have received limited response from the residents in these areas although it is estimated that approximately 14,035 residents of Frisco meet the low- and moderate-income limits as set by HUD (United States Census Bureau / American Factfinder, 2019) and there are an estimated 13,140 owner-occupied units experiencing a housing burden (cost of housing > 30% of household income) (City of Frisco, 2018). Our rehabilitation services are not offered to individuals and families renting a property.

Discussion

The City assists low- and moderate-income homeowners throughout the city with the rehabilitation of their current home. Emphasis is placed on major systems such as roofing, foundation, windows, doors, and electrical repairs. The City also provides repairs for qualifying residents that are faced with health and safety concerns, as well as residents that require updates to address mobility issues due to age or disability.

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

The Frisco Housing Authority currently has twenty (20) multifamily units located in two neighborhoods in the oldest section of the City. The Frisco Housing Authority does not accept Housing Choice Vouchers.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

In April 2019, the Frisco Housing Authority (FHA) opened their waiting list for two (2) and three (3) bedroom units. FHA staff received over 400 applications for housing for the limited spaces available. The FHA publishes their “Waiting List Preference Policy” and make it readily available to individuals and families interested in applying for residency with the FHA.

According to the FHA plan, continued efforts will be placed on the provision of upgrades to the units, continued modernization, encouragement of education and employment opportunities through partnerships with Frisco ISD, the City of Frisco, and the Texas Workforce Commission.

The 2020 Program Year includes a project with the FHA for a public improvement project on gas lines with use of prior year CDBG funds. This project is in the beginning environmental review stages at the time of submission.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The City works closely with the Frisco Housing Authority (FHA) in providing information about homeownership programs and materials, Section 3 opportunities, and Fair Housing opportunities to the residents of FHA. Also, the City completes the required annual Environmental Review for the Frisco Housing Authority. The City is not involved in the day-to-day management of the Housing Authority.

Unfortunately, there is minimal opportunity to purchase a starter home in Frisco. The current average home price is \$442,606 due to increasing sales prices and home values. Much of this is due to the increased movement into the North Texas area from more expensive areas of the country. Over the past five (5) years, major corporations such as Toyota have moved to our area, causing exponential growth. The Frisco Housing Authority continues to encourage our residents to learn to use their money wisely

and pursue educational opportunities to obtain better employment and salaries.

The Frisco Housing Authority is a high performing housing authority.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

Throughout Collin County and the City of Frisco, as with most areas of the country, homelessness has become an increasing challenge. The top underlying reasons for homelessness in Frisco from the 2019 Point-In-Time (PIT) count included an inability to pay one's rent or mortgage, unemployment, and/or the victim of domestic violence. There were 3 individuals identified as homeless in the City of Frisco in the 2019 PIT Count. Of those, 3 were unsheltered.

Persons experiencing homelessness face many barriers to finding and securing housing and require a variety of services to fully address their needs. These services can include food, housing, employment training, transportation, mental and physical health, and case management. The City of Frisco has been actively engaged in numerous activities to address and prevent homelessness and provide support to local non-profits that serve this population. In this one-year Action Plan, the City will support multiple programs addressing homelessness using both HUD funds and City general funds.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The needs of homeless persons are complex and require a wide range of specialized services. Numerous agencies are often involved in the care of a homeless person, providing distinct functions such as housing, mental health counseling, employment training, and casework services. Most of the facilities for the persons experiencing homelessness are not located in Frisco. This one-year Action Plan includes funding for homeless prevention services through Frisco Family Services. Frisco Family Services uses CDBG funding to provide bi-lingual counseling services to those at-risk of homelessness. Frisco Family Services also utilizes other funding to augment services to those at-risk of homelessness. They provide food, rent, utility assistance, and case management services to prevent residents from becoming homeless. During this fiscal year, the City increased funding to the Samaritan Inn. The Samaritan Inn provides transitional shelter and services to persons experiencing homelessness.

City staff will work with the Continuum of Care collaborative applicants in Dallas and Denton counties to provide outreach support, and coordinate services. City staff and community volunteers also participate in the annual Point-in-Time Count as prescribed by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. City staff has made the Collin County Community Resources informational sheet available at strategic areas throughout the city. Staff at City Hall's Information Desk, Library, Human Resources, the Frisco Police Department, the Frisco Fire Department, and Finance have access to this information.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Frisco, the Collin County Homeless Coalition, Denton County Homeless Coalition, and the Metro Dallas Homeless Alliance (Continuum of Care) continue to coordinate, identify, and work toward meeting the needs of the homeless. The 2019 Point-in-Time Count in these communities indicates an increase in homelessness. Collin County cities do not have adequate emergency shelter and transitional housing beds to meet the growing need. However, local governments and CoC participants continue to seek additional resources and cooperation.

The City has prioritized shelter services through CDBG public service funding. The Samaritan Inn provides shelter for individuals and families experiencing homelessness in Collin County. The Samaritan Inn will serve approximately five (5) Frisco residents with the funding made available through the public engagement process. Transitional housing is not funded through CDBG, but the City has provided general funds through the City's Social Services Grant to City House to provide housing to homeless youth (18-21). General funds are also provided to fund domestic violence shelters and essential services through Hope's Door, Texas Muslim Women's Foundation, and The Family Place. Additionally, the City was awarded CARES CDBG-CV funding to address homeless prevention and wraparound services in a previous Program Year and are actively working with local organizations to provide services.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Frisco, the Collin County Homeless Coalition, Denton County Homeless Coalition, and the Metro Dallas Homeless Alliance (Continuum of Care) continue to coordinate, identify, and work toward meeting the needs of the homeless. The 2019 Point-in-Time Count in these communities indicates an increase in homelessness. Collin County cities do not have adequate emergency shelter and transitional housing beds to meet the growing need. However, local governments and CoC participants continue to seek additional resources and cooperation.

The City has prioritized shelter service through CDBG public service funding. The Samaritan Inn provides shelter for individuals and families experiencing homelessness in Collin County. Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

The City of Frisco, the Collin County Homeless Coalition, Denton County Homeless Coalition, and the Metro Dallas Homeless Alliance (Continuum of Care) continue to coordinate, identify, and work toward meeting the needs of the homeless. The 2019 Point-in-Time Count in Frisco indicates no change in the number of homeless within the City of Frisco. The cities do not have adequate emergency shelter and transitional housing beds to meet the growing need. However, local governments and CoC participants continue to seek additional resources and cooperation. They correctly are utilizing HMIS to coordinate efforts.

The City has utilized CDBG funds to provide homeless prevention services through Frisco Family Services (FFS). FFS exists to help members of our community who are facing hunger, homelessness, and other urgent needs improve their quality of life and achieve self-sufficiency. FFS will provide bilingual caseworker services to residents of Frisco who are facing the barriers that can lead to homelessness including emergency financial assistance for rent/mortgage, utilities, food, prescription medications, clothing, and adult life skills classes. Additionally, city resources augment services offered by FFS to provide fresh and frozen produce, meat, and dairy items to eligible residents through the FFS Food Pantry to prevent hunger and the social and physical issues created by its realization. Furthermore, the City was awarded CARES CDBG-CV funding to address homeless prevention and wraparound services in a previous Program Year and are actively working with local organizations to provide services including the continuation of a project to cover short-term rental/mortgage/utility assistance (no more than 3 months) or other services to include, but not limited to domestic violence services or youth services as needed.

Discussion

The City of Frisco will utilize Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Public Service and Social Service grant funds to address needs of homeless residents, senior residents, and low- and moderate-income residents at-risk of homelessness or in need of short-term assistance.

The Samaritan Inn - The City of Frisco has funded this organization to provide transitional housing to Frisco residents struggling with homelessness. The Samaritan Inn is the only adult homeless shelter in

Collin County. The amount of funding was decreased slightly this year to \$40,222 due to increased need across the remaining public services and the availability of CARES Act funding to meet COVID-19 related issues. The City of Frisco has received more calls from residents struggling with homelessness in the previous fiscal year than in any other year. Due to the size of our counties (Collin and Denton), assistance from the local homeless service providers is inadequate.

Meals on Wheels of Collin County - The City of Frisco has provided \$25,000 in funding to Meals on Wheels of Collin County to address needs of our seniors who may not otherwise receive consistent, nutritious meals. This program has been in place for approximately ten (10) years and Meals on Wheels provides over 4,000 meals per year to elderly Frisco residents.

The CDBG funding is capped at 20 percent for public services (\$134,374) therefore, the City of Frisco provides an additional \$223,440 to social service providers to address the needs of our residents including low- and moderate-income residents, seniors and elderly, persons and families impacted by domestic violence or child abuse, persons with HIV/AIDS or impacted by another disability. Services include housing for homeless youth, grief support for families impacted by the loss of a loved one, addressing transportation needs, advocacy for individuals and families impacted by domestic violence or child abuse, nutritious meals for families and children, educational opportunities, and preventative medical services for seniors.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction:

The Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI) completed in 2020, provided a comprehensive review of the City's administrative and judicial policies. The report addressed the location, availability, and accessibility of housing and is used in planning. Impediments to Fair Housing were categorized into five areas and the City has included the efforts that will be made over the next year to address those goals indicated by the AI:

- Discrimination – Most landlords will not accept renters paying with housing subsidies.
Community opposition to the spread of affordable housing throughout Frisco continues.
- Lack of investment – The tendency to overlook certain neighborhoods and services serves to exacerbate existing segregation and leave some people behind. Failure to invest in the economic well-being of struggling residents leads to a lack of access to opportunity.
- Lack of affordable housing – Rising housing costs and limited access to housing assistance make it increasingly difficult for support and service workers, low-income families and persons living on fixed incomes, including seniors and persons with disabilities, to find housing.
- Lack of affordable transportation – Affordable transportation options are not adequate to support participation in work, commercial and civic life, and recreation.
- Lack of integrated, supported, affordable housing for persons with disabilities – Most persons with disabilities find housing completely unaffordable, especially when compared with limited and fixed incomes.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the

return on residential investment

1. Meet the community needs of affordable housing for all range of income groups.
2. Increase supply of accessible, affordable housing for persons with disabilities.
3. Make investments to increase access to affordable transportation options for low-income households and persons with disabilities.
4. Increase support and services for residents with housing assistance.
5. Increase access to information and resources on fair and affordable housing.

Discussion:

The City of Frisco CDBG staff refers people requesting to file a housing discrimination complaint to the Texas Workforce Commission Fair Housing Program which has been tasked with receiving complaints, investigating allegations, and reconciling complaints concerning fair housing in the rental, sale, financing or appraisal of housing. The state and federal Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability (mental or physical) or familial status. The Fair Housing Program documents and investigates complaints provides advice about remedies under fair housing laws and coordinates legal services to assist victims of housing discrimination. The Fair Housing Program offers fair housing seminars and presentations to interested parties.

A barrier to fair housing is affordable housing, and in Frisco, the high cost of housing has been created by a demand for housing, both existing and new, which exceeds the current supply. Frisco is perceived as a desirable place to live and has experienced growth in both businesses that wish to operate here and in people who want to reside here. Toyota has moved its headquarters to West Plano, and many people will be moving to the area., and Frisco expects to have many new families move to Frisco as a result. This movement puts a strain on housing availability and drives up prices.

The cost of site acquisition is currently high, and development costs remain high. These costs make Frisco housing construction expensive and put affordable housing out of the reach of low-income households. The City recognizes that land costs, carrying fees, and development fees often make affordable housing development economically unachievable. Therefore, the City waives all permit fees for non-profit developers.

An additional barrier to Fair Housing was identified in the Housing Needs Assessment of the Consolidated Plan as stringent criteria in the mortgage origination process due to the foreclosure crisis, which also is outside the scope and control of City policy. In some instances, issues revolving around personal finances (lack of down payment, credit history, employment history) affect the availability of affordable housing for Frisco residents.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction:

This section will describe the City's plan to use 2021 program funds to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs, foster and maintain affordable housing, evaluate and reduce lead-based paint hazards, reduce the number of poverty-level families, develop institutional structure and enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The most significant challenge to meeting underserved needs in the coming year will be meeting the increased need for program activities with a limited amount of funding. To overcome this significant challenge, the City will work more efficiently, seek a higher level of collaboration with other agencies and organizations, and aggressively seek opportunities to leverage CDBG funds.

Further, the City recognizes the obstacles of meeting underserved needs in the City. City Council created a general fund Social Service Grant (SSG) several years ago, and it is used to augment social services provided to our low- and moderate-income residents. The budget for this program is based on \$1 per capita which will be used to fund social service agencies that provide healthcare, clothing, food, counseling, education, emergency financial assistance, transitional housing, and domestic violence shelter. The budget for the FY21 general fund Social Service Grant is \$223,440.

Recognizing that transportation is an issue for residents, the City Council has created a new Social Service Grant – Transportation fund. This grant is based on \$0.25 per capita, which will be utilized to provide grantees additional funding to provide transportation options for clients that do not have readily available transportation options. This grant will allow collaboration with other service providers, as well as empower clients to access necessary services to resolve their current barriers to affordable housing. The budget for the FY21 general fund Transportation Grant is \$55,860.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City emphasizes seeing that decent, safe, affordable housing is available for low-income residents to the most significant extent possible. Rehabilitation of owner-occupied housing units is a high priority, as these efforts preserve affordable housing units and allow struggling residents to retain their home. Rehabilitation is particularly crucial for extremely low-income and elderly homeowners and may serve to prevent homelessness.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

All CDBG-funded housing rehabilitation projects include a lead-based paint assessment or inspection as required by 24 CFR Part 35. To mitigate and abate lead-based paint hazards, the City provides

information and technical assistance to households receiving support under the Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation program.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City will continue to support programs that expand anti-poverty programs for both low-income families as well as families which may be threatened with poverty through homeless prevention strategies. The City of Frisco recognizes that the core of many social and housing problems relates to poverty. The objective of poverty reduction requires programming for broad areas, including increased accessibility of resources, job training and placement, public services, education, and necessary skills development. It is only through comprehensive, coordinated strategies that nurture skills and provide opportunities to gain and retain employment and thus improve the quality of life that people can improve their situation.

Because the nature of poverty is complex and multi-faceted, the City will continue to allocate some CDBG funds for services to very low-income households. Research shows that some of these services may have a direct impact on lowering the poverty rate for family households. Therefore, the City will fund programs such as the Frisco Family Services bi-lingual case management. In addition to case management partially paid for by CDBG funds, the program provides emergency financial resources to individuals and families that require rent/mortgage, utility, medication, and transportation assistance.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The City has identified gaps in institutional structure for implementing the Consolidated Plan and methods to enhance coordination among housing agencies and social service providers. These gaps include a lack of enough resources, limited coordination between service providers, and the difficulty of social services agencies in obtaining Frisco-specific data.

The gap in the institutional structure and service delivery system in Frisco was identified as the need for more and better information sharing among agencies and organizations that provide services. The City offers collaboration meeting time for applicants during the annual grant application workshop.

During the past grant year, the City implemented the Neighborly platform to assist for our grant needs. The City offered the grant application process through Neighborly this grant cycle and received 20 applications for funding. Three (3) subrecipients were chosen to receive CDBG funding (\$100,780). These subrecipients address homeless prevention and homeless services to address immediate needs of Frisco residents. Thirteen (13) subrecipients were chosen to receive Social Service Grant funds (\$223,440), and of those thirteen (13) subrecipients, eight (8) were awarded \$50,860 in Social Service Grant – Transportation funding and one (1) non-CDBG/SSG subgrantee was awarded \$5,000 in Social Service Grant – Transportation funding.

The City continues to seek new partners and to enhance relationships with existing partners in City

departments and social service agencies to improve and better coordinate the delivery of programs and services. The city will seek opportunities to leverage the limited available resources.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

Through the Denton County Homeless Coalition, a program has been implemented to meet with public housing organizations, private housing landlords, municipalities, United Way, and social service organizations to discuss the housing access obstacles facing persons with Housing Choice Vouchers (formerly Section 8) and VA housing vouchers. Housing inventory is down, and demand is up resulting in a dramatic increase in local rents. Renting to individuals without the added government paperwork is preferable to most landlords. This program is trying to build paths for housing voucher holders to secure housing.

Any funds that may be received in excess of the \$13,000 anticipated will be held and accounted for reprogramming in the 2022 Annual Action Plan.







6. Presentation from Texas Muslim Women's Foundation.

No members from the Texas Muslim Women's Foundation were present.

7. Presentation from Boys & Girls Clubs of Collin County.

Mary Ann Bradley, CEO of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Collin County presented the Board with a history and overview of the development of the Clubs and the effects it has had on the youth in the community.

Ms. Bradley continued sharing the various locations across Collin County and the enrichment programs available to the children, increasing graduation rates and encouraging positive life choices with the youth involved.

Ms. Bradley discussed limitations COVID has placed on the Boys and Girls Club, limiting attendance at some of the locations due to social distancing restrictions. Other COVID related setbacks have been the increased costs and lack of local donations and funding to the Clubs. Special events hosted by the Clubs have historically been a large source of income from both citizen and corporate donations, with social distancing limitations, a number of special events were canceled, leading to a significant drop in donations.

Ms. Bradley shared with the Board the increased number of reported cases of anxiety and depression in younger members of the Clubs, ages 6 to 13 showed a significant increase. Given these statistics, the Clubs have begun developing programs to help the children cope with handling these issues.

8. Presentation from Children's Advocacy Center for Denton County.

Kristin Howell, CEO of the Children's Advocacy Center for Denton County, presented to the board the services provided by the Center to the youth of Denton County. Ms. Howell discussed the significant increase in the number of child abuse cases within the last year, increasing more than 364 percent within the last year.

Ms. Howell shared with the board the three locations the Children's Advocacy Center for Denton County has, and the safe welcoming amenities the Centers offer to the children needing the facilities. The impacts of COVID has increased the number of child abuse cases and the facilities offer space for children to come cope and feel safe.

Ms. Howell continues discussing the additional setbacks COVID has had on the prosecution side of the abuse cases, the one year set back from COVID and court closures has set prosecution and closure of case back four years in some cases.

9. Presentation from Frisco Fastpacs.

Heather Canterbury, Director of Frisco Fastpacs introduced herself and discussed the program Frisco Fastpacs provided to school aged children in Frisco. Ms. Canterbury highlights the mission of the organization is to make sure all school aged children in Frisco have food to eat.

Ms. Canterbury continues, sharing with the Board the weekend meals program offered, gathering meal packs on Thursdays and delivering them to the children so they have food to eat on the weekends, just as they would on a school day.

Ms. Canterbury discussed with the board the growing need of Fastpacs for families in Frisco. A large part of the increase is thought to be due to the increased numbers of kids that are returning to in-person learning, while before they were

virtual learning and not receiving the meals as much while at home. She continues talking about joint agencies that provide meals to virtual learning students, so they have options for meals as well.

10. Presentation from Meals on Wheels of Collin County.

Michelle Borckardt, Grants Manager of Meals on Wheels of Collin County presented to the Board the statistics of meals needed due to age, poverty and mobility issues. Ms. Borckardt discussed how the program also provides safety checks on the clients as well, notifying proper staff if there is a concern to ensure the need is addressed.

Ms. Borckardt continued by sharing with the board the positive effects the Meals on Wheels program has had on the seniors of the community. Statistics have shown the positive impacts the nutrition and contact with staff the program has had on the vulnerable demographic they serve.

11. Board discussion on Virtual Grant Workshop/Agency Training.

Sarah Carroll led a discussion with the Board on the upcoming Virtual Grant Workshop/Agency Training. Ms. Carroll has developed a presentation for this event that she will present to virtual attendees. There is set to be over 55 attendees this year due to the virtual learning platform.

Laura Rummel introduced herself to the Board, sharing that she has had great interest and desired involvement with this Board for several years.

REPORTS

3. Report on the January 2021 Point-In-Time Count.

Page 1 of 7

Sarah Carroll shared with the board that the official Point-in-Time Count did not happen as originally planned. Ms. Carroll shared with the Board that Denton County held a modified version of the count, focusing on the sheltered homeless. Surrounding non-profit groups worked with the County to make calls to shelters and gather information from the individuals.

Collin County's plan is to open the count period for two weeks, February 18, 2021 through March 3, 2021. Three staff from the City, in partnership with Frisco Police Department, will be going out to the known hotspots on February 19, 2021 to seek unsheltered homeless. Ms. Carroll continued saying the number of questions on the count has been reduced this year to reduce contact time and the risk of COVID-19 exposure.

4. Report on the January Virtual Grant Workshop/Agency Training.

Sarah Carroll shared with the Board the result of the Virtual Grant Workshop/Agency Training, sharing that the training walked through the new Grant software, Neighborly. Ms. Carroll continued by thanking Shawna Dancer for her help and participation during the workshop.

Chair Haq asked Ms. Carroll if there would be training for the Board on how to utilize Neighborly software. Ms. Carroll indicated that training will be provided at the March Social Services and Housing Board meeting.

5. Report on Pre-Applications Received, Grant Process, and Timeline.

Sarah Carroll reported to the Board the status of the pre-applications received and the Grant Process and Timeline. Ms. Carroll shared with the Board that as of February 10, 2021, 17 organizations have requested pre-applications, 15 applications are in progress and 2 have been submitted. Ms. Carroll commented there will be a Legal Notice of Funding Availability running in the paper in the coming days, expecting that to increase the number of interested applicants. The Grant will close on February 19, 2021.

Ms. Carroll shared a brief timeline with the Board, saying by June the review process by the Board will be complete allowing Ms. Carroll to take it to the next steps for funding and Annual Action Plan.

7. Presentation from Hope's Door New Beginning.

Christina Coultas, CEO of Hope's Door New Beginning Center. Ms. Coultas provided the Board with an overview on what Hope's Door New Beginning Center provides to the community. Their service area ranges from Plano to Northeast Dallas into Garland. Ms. Coultas outlines the services provided by their organization, providing legal support and advocacy, 24-hour hotline, shelter services and trauma support.

Ms. Coultas continues by sharing with the Board her organization is seeking support for their Survivor Services program which provide direct services to domestic violence victims. The organization is requesting \$20,000 in support.

8. Presentation from Veteran's Center of North Texas.

Paul Hendricks from the Veteran's Center of North Texas provided the Board with an overview of the Veteran's Center of North Texas, a volunteer organization. Mr. Hendricks shared with the Board the Center's involvement in the annual homeless count, providing information for the homeless and care packages.

Mr. Hendricks continued sharing that one of the major achievements of the Center is they provide over 12,000 meals to Veterans in need over the year. Mr. Hendricks told the Board another important role of the Center is working with the Veterans to plan for their future, including housing, financial management, as well as providing services for mental health. The organization is requesting \$10,000 in support for housing, and \$5,000 in support for running the facility for utilities and other operational costs.

Chair Haq asked Mr. Hendricks what are some of the root causes for Veterans in need? Mr. Hendricks replied the primary issue seen is the lack of financial management.

Mr. Hendricks continued discussion with the board, highlighting a 30% decrease in expected funding from donations due to COVID-19, and discussing the recent increase in homeless women veterans in need of assistance. With the age

group between 35 and 45 years old, a lot of these women have children, requiring extra assistance for childcare.

9. Presentation from Texas Muslim Women's Foundation.

Syeda Ali, Grant Manager from the Texas Muslim Women's Foundation presented to the Board a request of \$10,000 in funding for the Foundation's domestic violence program.

Ms. Ali continued highlighting the domestic violence protection services provided by the Foundation. Texas Muslim Women's Foundation provides emergency shelter services, including housing victims in hotels, and providing advocacy services such as CPS liaison services and counseling services for women and children.

10. Presentation from Samaritan Inn.

Rick Crocker, CEO of Samaritan Inn in McKinney came to the Board to discuss the services provided by the Samaritan Inn. The Inn is a transitional homeless program for single men, single women, and families, not an emergency homeless shelter. Collin County currently does not have an emergency homeless shelter. The Inn works with residents to help prepare a plan for moving forward while providing a safe place to live. All person hygiene items, food, and laundry facilities are provided to residents at no cost. Residents at the Inn are also provided work and school uniforms, and clothing.

Mr. Crocker continued highlighting the programs the Inn provides to families, including school classrooms, summer camp programs so the children are cared for during the day so parents can work. Transitional residents are moved from the Inn into 18-month term apartment housing to continue their transition. The Inn has a goal of 50% success rate in helping residents complete the program and fully transition after the 18-month apartment living program.

Mr. Crocker shared with the Board the number of residents being housed in hotels instead of at the Inn and other shelters, due to the rise in funding due to COVID-19. Mr. Crocker discussed the cases where police departments have been using the Inn as an emergency shelter, that is not what the Inn is set up for, in these cases the Inn will work with surrounding area shelters to have case managers help transport them and provide them with vouchers.

11. Presentation from The Family Place.

Melissa Sherrill, Vice President of The Family Place presents the Board the history and background of The Family Place. Starting as a hotline in 1978, The Family Place is now a full-service family violence shelter. There are two emergency shelters available, a transitional housing program, school services

for children and counseling services are also provided. The Family Place continues to receive over 11,000 phone calls on the hotline per year, with people reaching out for resources and options.

Ms. Sherrill continued outlining the outreach services provided, school programs for children, counseling programs, career programs for adults. Doctor resources are available for residents as well.

Mr. Sherrill discussed the COVID ramifications The Family Place has felt. Their doors remained open yet some of the counseling services and other services were put on hold due to COVID restrictions. The services that were on hold were able to return to operation in April 2020.

12. Presentation from Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Denton County.

Cheri Fry, Program Director of Casa of Denton County provided the Board with an overview of Casa. Casa is a court appointed children's advocacy program. The program is a nationwide, yet independently ran offices, it is volunteer based case managers providing services to children of Denton County.

Ms. Fry continued by sharing with the Board the effects COVID has had on the services provided by Casa. With families being home more the number of abuse cases was on the rise.

Funding for Casa is provided primarily by fund raisers and community funding. Casa requested \$23,000 in funding assistance from the board.

Ms. Fry was asked what the term of a case for a volunteer working with a child. Ms. Fry replied the ideal term is 12 to 18 months per child, and the volunteers have had great success in working with the children for that amount of time.





3. Presentation from CASA of Collin County.

Trisha Clifton with Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Collin County presented to the Board the mission and purpose of CASA.

CASA has been serving the children of Frisco and Collin County since 1991 where they provide services to investigate and advocate in court for the best interest of children that have been abused or neglected and placed into the child welfare system. Each appointed advocate meets with a child twice a month, speaks to anyone involved with the case, testify in court proceedings, and write formal court reports.

Each advocate is required to do a 35-hour intensive training prior to serving children. In addition, there is ongoing training throughout the year to maintain qualifications. The annual operating budget for CASA is \$1.6 million, they requested \$20,000.00 in grant funding from the City of Frisco to go towards pre-service and ongoing training of Advocates, travel to child visits and court hearings, to help fund collaborative team meetings and for use towards medical, educational, and therapeutic visits. These funds would enable CASA to ensure they are able to provide care for each child in need.

4. Presentation from Metro Relief.

Katie Besley, Chief Strategist with Metro Relief presented to the Board, the mission and purpose of the organization.

Metro Relief is a strategic mobile outreach organization set up to combat homelessness. They go directly to homeless and develop relationships and provide mobile case management to help people get out of homelessness. Metro Relief has piloted their mobile program in other North Texas cities and have seen significant results.

Metro Relief's street outreach in Frisco would be working in collaboration with the City of Frisco and the Frisco Police Department and other North Dallas Metro Alliance organizations to decrease the number of unsheltered individuals.

The Board asked what Metro Relief as an organization focused on prior to its time working with Cities. Prior to collaboration with city agencies its main focus was inner-city Dallas and inner-city Fort Worth. After working with North Dallas Metro Alliance for so many years Metro Relief wanted to develop relationships with smaller city agencies as well in an effort to reach more of the homeless individuals in smaller cities based on the information and knowledge the smaller city governments have about the homeless in their communities.

Metro Relief requested grant funding in the amount of \$9,000.00, their overall annual budget is \$750,000.00 for Collin County and the greater Dallas area.

5. Presentation from Helen's Project.

There were no representatives from Helen's Project in attendance.

6. Presentation from City House.

Jennifer Lovejoy, the Director of Programs with City House presented to the Board the mission and purpose of the organization.

City House requested \$31,000.00 in grant funding from the City of Frisco, \$5,000.00 of that for transportation assistance, with an annual program budget of \$423,000.00. The transitional living program is designed to help young adults ages 18-21 years old, with 3 housing facilities located in Plano. The facilities are broken into three separate categories, a male facility, female facility and a co-ed facility which provides housing for the LGTB community. The youth helped by City House come from referrals from churches, schools and peer community referrals.

Services provided to the youth include education, employment, financial, medical and mental health services and long-term stable housing. These services are provided to the youth through the 18-month program where the end goal is to see them transition into long-term stable housing.

7. Presentation from Treasured Vessels.

Elizabeth, Critical Educator and therapist with Treasured Vessels presented to the Board the mission and purpose of the organization.

Treasured Vessels offers services to sex trafficked youth. The five-phase program helps provide safety and stability to survivors. Treasured Vessels

provides medical, dental, educational assistance, legal services, substance abuse support and financial services.

Treasured Vessels requested \$66,000.00 in grant funding from the City of Frisco, their annual budget is \$395,000.00. The requested funding would go towards secondary-phase housing for survivors of trafficking.

8. Presentation from Journey of Hope.

Carey Newman, Program Director with Journey of Hope presented to the Board the mission and purpose of their organization. Ms. Newman introduced the new Executive Director, Susan English

Journey of Hope provides support for youth who have experienced the death of a loved one. They provide services focused on supporting childhood bereavement. Children are provided space to share about fears and emotions felt because of the death. Since COVID, the support group meetings have moved to online and Journey developed care packs to be dropped off at houses for the youth.

Support group facilitators are volunteers, these volunteers provide services in the group, provide meals for in-person support groups and help run events for the children.

Journey of Hope requested \$42,668.00 in grant funding from the City of Frisco.

9. Presentation from Cornerstone Assistance Network NCT.

Jennifer Lutz, Executive Director of Cornerstone Assistance Network of North Central Texas, presented to the Board the mission and purpose of their organization.

Cornerstone Assistance Network provides case management services to local families, working together to help families be self-sufficient. They help with financial strain, finding and securing a job and they do this with holding families accountable to their plan.

The number one focus of Cornerstone Assistance Network is to help families on the brink of becoming homeless regain financial control over their home.

Cornerstone Assistance Network requested \$75,000.00 in grant funding from the City of Frisco.

10. Presentation from Frisco Family Services.

Joannie Clair, Director of Strategy for Frisco Family Services presented to the Board the mission and purpose of their organization and the new program they are rolling out with their Frisco food pantry.

For over 27 years Frisco Family Services have been serving families in need in Frisco and Frisco ISD. Serving as Frisco's only food pantry, they are now offering a curbside pick-up option like many other retail supermarkets have done during the times of COVID. During a time of crisis, families in Frisco and Frisco ISD can get fresh produce, meat, dairy and more from the food pantry.

Frisco Family Services requested \$127,434.00 in grant funding from the City of Frisco to go towards the food pantry program, bi-lingual case management services and transportation assistance that would be used for gas cards for families in need to help people get to and from job interviews or get to their job.






